Hereditary cancer genetic counseling

Supporting you with genetics expertise



Our knowledge of genetic information is changing rapidly, and understanding your choices can be complicated. Labcorp can help.

Our genetic counselors work with you and your healthcare provider to help you understand your hereditary cancer risks and testing options. You may meet with a genetic counselor when you are considering genetic testing, or to discuss your results after genetic testing.

What is a genetic counselor?

A genetic counselor is a **healthcare professional** specifically trained in medical genetics and counseling who can help you understand if you have an increased risk for hereditary cancer. Genetic counselors are **experts** at evaluating your **personal** medical and family history, identifying your genetic risks, and helping you understand the tests available to you.



What is hereditary cancer and why might genetic counseling be recommended?

Everyone has a risk to develop cancer, and about 40% of Americans will be diagnosed with cancer during their lifetime.¹ Approximately 5 to 10% of all cancer is hereditary, meaning the cancer was caused by an inherited mutation (or a change) in a gene.² Cancers that may be inherited include breast, ovarian, endometrial, colorectal and pancreatic cancer.

Genetic testing is available to determine whether you have a mutation that increases your risk to develop certain cancers. Based on your personal or family history of cancer, your healthcare provider may recommend genetic counseling. During genetic counseling, you will meet with a genetic counselor who will ask questions about your personal and family medical history, explain your risk for hereditary cancer and discuss the genetic testing options that may be appropriate.

If you have already received genetic testing, your healthcare provider may recommend genetic results counseling or a comprehensive genetic counseling session with Labcorp to explain your test results and help you chart a course for how to use this knowledge.

What happens during cancer genetic results counseling?

During this visit, a genetic counselor will review your hereditary cancer test results and the information outlined in the report. If you want to receive a comprehensive cancer genetic risk assessment, including a review of your personal and family medical history, comprehensive genetic counseling is recommended.



Why might my healthcare provider refer me for hereditary cancer genetic counseling with Labcorp?

Your healthcare provider may recommend genetic counseling for a wide range of reasons,^{2,3} including a personal and/or family history of:

- Breast cancer at age 50 or younger or multiple primary breast cancers
- Colorectal or uterine cancer at age 50 or younger
- The same cancers seen in multiple generations
- Breast cancer in an individual of Ashkenazi
 ancestry
- Ovarian, pancreatic or male breast cancer
- A known hereditary cancer mutation

Talk with your healthcare provider to see if genetic counseling or genetics results counseling is right for you. You will receive your hereditary cancer genetic testing results from your healthcare provider, who will direct you to schedule your appointment online at womenshealth.labcorp.com/genetic- counseling.	During genetic results counseling, the genetic counselor will discuss your specific genetic test results, your risk for cancer based on your specific genetic results, any inherited genetic conditions identified by genetic testing, and the implications the results may have for other family members. This session is conducted via telephone.	It is important that you speak with your healthcare provider to determine your specific cancer surveillance and screening plan and discuss whether follow-up genetic testing is indicated based on these results.	Results counseling is included in the cost of your hereditary cancer genetic test.
